Finley Church- An all volunteer organization!

What makes us get up on Sunday, (likely the only day we have off) get dressed, put on the smiling face, and sit in the pew for an hour? Where does the motivation come from? Is it routine? Loyalty to Finley? Fear? The thirst to see God? Whatever its source, unless your parents are forcing you, it is not from an external pressure. Meaning that whatever causes you to come to church, the final choice rests within you!

You alone have the authority to decide whether you will go to church! While I would love that everyone in Stuart's Draft be a part of the Finley worship, I have no business trying to force anyone into coming here. Ultimately, coming to Finley on Sunday may be the biggest act of freedom you get to exercise all week!

Based on this understanding of freedom, when I say every week that it is an honor that you have chosen Finley, that honor extends to everyone...from our first time visitors to even our longest tenured members. When all is said and done, no one is required to be here! That makes church an all-volunteer organization!

This month, session has decided to highlight stewardship. As such, the congregation will review the budget for the year and petitions for volunteers will be solicited to carry out the mission of Finley. For church leaders to be effective, they will have to energize and motivate the body!

In the business world, the primary method of motivation is financial gain. But in an all-volunteer organization, that motivational tool is not usually at our disposal. The real challenge then becomes meeting all the obligations of the church via some other motivational method.

While financial gain may motivate the business world, it certainly does not motivate our faith! True motivation only comes from the Holy Spirit. The Spirit breathes life in our nostrils, energizes us to walk in obedience to Christ, and gives us a deep compassion for the world. Therefore, when we see a church body that nurtures our youth, cares for the elderly, steeps itself in scripture, reaches out in the community, and spreads the gospel all over the world, we find ourselves energized and motivated. A church that faithfully carries out the work of God will never have to make empty petitions for cash and volunteers; their actions in the world will do all the talking! When requests are made, the obligations are met willingly and with enthusiasm.

I am glad that each of you made a commitment to serving at Finley. Whatever talents, time, or treasures you have decided to offer, they will be taken in with greatest appreciation. After working with the session for a while, I know that they seek everything to be distributed in the highest regard, to the glory of God. You have been blessed with some great elders!

Future sessions will continue to make budgets and solicit volunteers to support church functions; but just know that all of it is a big waste of time without a group of people freely deciding that Finley is worth their stewardship.

The question you should be asking yourself is, "Is Finley worth my stewardship?" I believe it is. Let's work together to make our Finley vision a reality!

Martha Stewart's Chocolate-Almond Pastries

1 sheet of frozen puff pastry, thawed

1 large egg, beaten

Sanding sugar, for sprinkling

1½ oz semisweet chocolate, coarsely chopped

Honey, for drizzling

Sea salt, for sprinkling

2 tbsp almonds, toasted and chopped



Preheat oven to 450°F. Line baking sheet with parchment paper. Place puff pastry on baking sheet, folding each edge to make a 1-inch crust. With fork, prick the middle of the pastry. Brush the crust with the beaten egg and sprinkle with sugar. Place in freezer for 15 minutes.

Place the baking sheet in the oven and bake for 15 to 20 minutes until pastry is brown. (Pastry will be puffed.) Cover the center with chocolate pieces, drizzle with honey and sprinkle the salt over the chocolate. Bake until the chocolate melts, approximately 2-3 minutes. Sprinkle the almonds on top, and cut the pastry into four squares. May be served with vanilla ice cream.

And as yummy as this is warm from the oven, Michelle and I want you to know that it's even yummiest the next morning for breakfast.

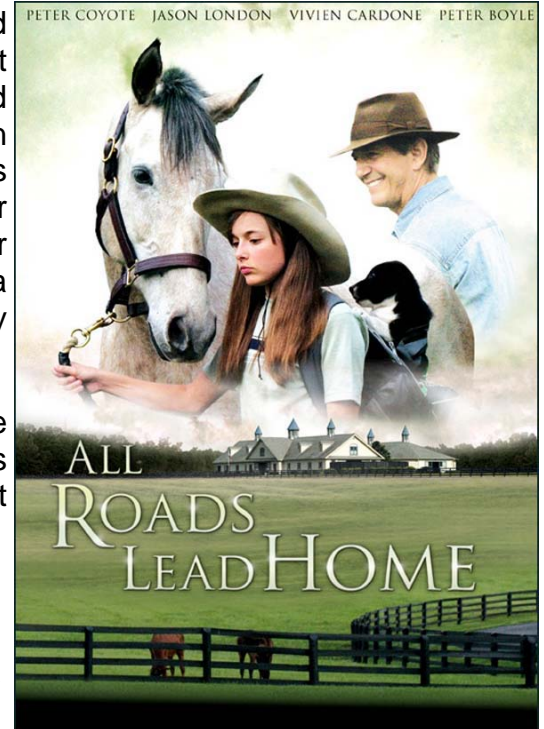
Finley Night at the Movies

FROM THE TREASURER**2009 YEAR END FINANCIAL REPORT**

We managed to get through 2009 with not too much damage to our overall financial strength. Our total assets slipped by \$14,833.00 over 2008. Total offerings were down \$11,496.00.

Most of the decrease can be attributed to the fact that we were in the second year of searching for a new pastor and it was hard to maintain attendance. The economy also played a big role.

\$7,000 was transferred from the general money market account to help meet current expenses. \$6,882 was transferred from the mission and outreach account to meet our mission projects. Most of that amount went to local outreach such as the Fire Department, Rescue Squad, Valley Missions, Valley Program for Aging Services, Augusta Free Clinic, Weekday Religious Education, SACRA, Salvation Army, needy kids at Stump elementary, M.R.'s PFF, etc.

Now that we have a new pastor and the economy is showing slight improvement, things should get better. We are not destitute by any means, but we could certainly use some improvement. There are some capital expenses facing us, such as roof repairs to the education wing. Depending on what is decided we may have to have a capital campaign. Stay tuned!

Total assets at the beginning of the year were \$59,931.89.

The total money market funds of \$26,823.81 compared to \$36,008.39 at the beginning of the year.

The mission and outreach fund will be increased by a 4,852.05 interest check from the trustees in January 2010.

At the January session meeting the session approved a budget of 146,261.00 for 2010. This is 7,865.00 less than the 2009 budget. It is a very conservative budget, and with your help we can meet it by averaging contributions, tithes & offerings of 2,813.00 per week.

So far through the first three Sundays this year we are averaging 2,897.00 per week. GOOD JOB!!

As we begin 2010 I sense a new enthusiasm at Finley. We have a new pastor-Don LaRue and a new administrator-Laura Latimer-Nolan. Laura is doing a fantastic job with the bulletin, Focus and getting the office organized. If you haven't met her yet, stop by any day Tuesday – Friday 9:00 to 2:00.

I want to thank you for your generous contributions in 2009 and look forward to greater things in 2010. With your help 2010 should be a banner year. **Jack**

Across The Pond - With Laura Latimer-Nolan

I miss Pancake Day! Although it might not always fall in February, Shrove Tuesday or Pancake Day has always been one of my favorite days. This year, pancake day is February 16th.

Shrove Tuesday is a term used in Ireland, the United Kingdom, Canada, New Zealand, and Australia for the day preceding Ash Wednesday, the first day of the Christian Lenten season of fasting and prayer. The word *shrove* is the past tense of the English verb *shrive*, which means to obtain absolution for one's sins by way of Confession and doing penance. Thus Shrove Tuesday gets its name from the shriving that English Christians were expected to do prior to receiving absolution immediately before Lent begins. Shrove Tuesday is the last day of Shrovetide, a season that developed after the Protestant Reformation. The celebratory aspect of the day is somewhat like the Carnival tradition that continued separately in Catholic countries of Latin Europe. The term "Shrove Tuesday" is no longer widely known in the United States.

In England and many other countries, the festival is widely associated with the eating of rich foods made with eggs, sugar and butter, such as pancakes. It is often known simply as Pancake Day, originally because making such foods used up ingredients such as sugar, fat and eggs, whose consumption was traditionally restricted during the fasting associated with Lent.

The pancakes we make in England are not like the ones we have here. They are more like the French style crepes than the spongy cake style US ones. Incidentally, the recipe for English pancakes is exactly the same as for Yorkshire Pudding. I think what makes English pancakes so different from American ones is the flour. You need to use what we call plain flour; which is flour without raising agents. You mix the flour into a batter with eggs, milk water and a pinch of salt and that is as simple as it gets. The pancakes are cooked in a little oil & butter in a hot frying pan.

I am not sure who made the best pancakes, my Gran or my Granddad. But they both served them differently. My Gran used to serve them with Golden Syrup (not Maple) and my Granddad with a squeeze of lemon juice and a sprinkling of sugar. Because they are thinner and less porous, you do not need as much topping. Either way, they are just delicious! I have not yet found the right flour in the US to make pancakes, and Golden Syrup is hard to come by. So my pancakes always turn out just like the ones from IHOP!

I mentioned Yorkshire Pudding earlier. I miss Yorkshire Pudding! Yorkshire pudding is a food that originated in Yorkshire, England, which is where I am from. It is made from the same batter as pancakes and most often served with roast beef, chicken, or any meal in which there is gravy. When wheat flour began to come into common use for making cakes and puddings, cooks in the north of England devised a means of making use of the fat that dropped into the dripping pan to cook a batter pudding while the meat roasted. Although the idea is probably much older, the recipe dates back to 1737.

The Yorkshire pudding is a staple of the British Sunday lunch and in some cases is eaten as a separate course prior to the main meat dish. It is often claimed that the purpose of the dish was to provide a cheap way to fill the diners - the Yorkshire pudding being much cheaper than the other constituents of the meal - thus stretching a lesser amount of the more expensive ingredients as the Yorkshire pudding was traditionally served first.

Yorkshire pudding is cooked by pouring the thin batter into a preheated greased baking tin containing very hot fat or oil and baking at very high heat until it has risen and browned. It is then served in slices or quarters, depending on the size of the tray in which it was cooked. Yorkshire pudding may also be made in the same pan as the meat, after the meat has been cooked and moved to a serving platter, which also takes advantage of the meat fat that is left behind. My Gran's pudding would rise up the sides of the pan so much it would get caught on the oven rack above it! When baked with sausages (within the batter), the dish is known as toad in the hole. However you cook the Yorkshire Pudding, it must be served with a good meat gravy. If you are serving Lamb, you can also add fresh mint sauce!

Yorkshire Pudding Day is the first Sunday in February. This year it s Feb 7th which also happens to be the day of Finley's crock pot cook off. You can not make Yorkshire pudding in a crock pot, but you can make some great beef stew to serve with it!

I miss Snowdrops! I have not yet seen snowdrops here in America. A snowdrop plant looks like 3 drops of milk hanging from a stem, which is probably where it got its Latin name *Galanthus*, which means milk-white flowers. Snowdrops are so small and delicate (about 3" tall) and usually flower in the early spring when there is snow on the ground. Celebrated as a sign of spring, snowdrops can form impressive carpets of white in woodlands and gardens. With all the recent snow, I keep expecting to see them popping up in the garden. Are you looking forward to spring as much as I am? - Laura

Easter Lily Sale

Look out for the order forms for this year's Easter Lily Sale. Order forms will be available in the Narthex and will also be included in the March edition of Focus.

The Lily's will come from Millmont and be used to decorate the sanctuary for the Easter services.

Easter lilies are a recent addition to the Easter celebration. The white Easter lily was introduced in Bermuda from Japan in the mid-1800s.

In 1882, W. K. Harris, a florist, introduced this flower to the United States. Since it is one of the earliest lilies to bloom in the Spring, it soon became known as the "Easter lily."

In Christian iconography, white lilies have always been the symbol of beauty, purity, and holiness. Even in the Gospel Matthew, our Lord referred to the lilies: "Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow; they neither toil nor spin; yet I tell you, even Solomon in all his glory was not arrayed like one of these" (6:28-29). Quite appropriately, these beautiful, large, white lilies became very popular in the Easter decorations of Churches, symbolizing the new life of our Risen Lord.

As an aside, a religious legend did arise concerning the lily: On Holy Thursday evening, when our Lord was in the Garden of Gethsemane, all of the flowers — except the proud, stately, most beautiful lily — bowed their heads in sorrow because of the ordeal our Lord was suffering. In the end, having witnessed our Lord's humility and sacrifice, the lily hung its head in shame, and has humbly done so to this day.
