Our Ministers Message

10 years ago this week, we were all wondering what our fate would be after the Y2K crash. While most of us were pretty sure our technological devices would still be able to serve us into the new decade, we still were not 100 % certain. At the nuclear plant, I made every effort to ensure I was as far away as possible; and I wasn't alone in my thinking!

In the end, nothing happened! All those satellites that were going to fall from the sky, all those power grids that were going to fail, all those banking records that were going to accumulate false amounts of interest; everything continued to operate and life went on unabated.

It has been my experience that people generally tend to overestimate the amount of fear and anxiety required for a certain life event. Have you ever heard someone say, "Gee, I really need to be more afraid next time?" No!! More often than not, we discover anticipating fear to be much harder than the actual event. No matter what happens, the world turns, the sun rises and sets and life's storms will eventually blow over.

I'm not saying that some of life's storms aren't tough. On the contrary, some storms may redirect even the best of our plans. Some storms may be so tempestuous, they will relentlessly rain upon us pain and suffering for the duration of our temporal lives. ...What I am simply saying is that when the storms approach, we should not be afraid of them.

Jesus tells us in Luke Chapter 12, "can any of you by worrying, add a single hour to your span of life? If then you are not able to do so small a thing as that, why do you worry about the rest?...Do not be afraid, little flock, for it is your Father's good pleasure to give you the kingdom...For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also."(NRSV)

I am not a fan of New Year's resolutions. As a minister, I don't believe in rehabilitation, I believe in transformation! In other words, it is futile for us to try and make ourselves better; as Christians, we look to God to renew us in faith! Instead of making a new year's resolution, ask God for a fearless heart!

As the chapters of Finley's future develop, it is going to take several new and brave ambassadors of the faith to stand up and be counted. As our church grows, we will see the creation of new 'atmospheric conditions and weather patterns'; some sunny and some blustery...who will have the boldness to brave the storms with me?

If I had to choose between fearlessness and losing 30lbs...I would choose fearlessness. While I certainly would benefit from both, I know that only one is from God! May God grant you peace and a new fearless heart in 2010!

Elaine Carter's Rigatoni

- 1 - 16 oz box of rigatoni, cooked according to package directions
- 1 - 28 oz can of san Marzano tomatoes
- 1 - 14 oz can of san Marzano tomatoes (optional—I like it extra tomatoey.)
- 2 - 8 oz packages of grated cheese (your favorite variety)
- 2 - tbsp of butter, cubed

In the bottom of a 2 quart casserole dish, dot 1 tbsp of the butter. Place half of the cooked rigatoni on top. On top of that, put half of your tomatoes, followed by half of the cheese. Repeat.

Bake at 350 °F for 30 minutes. Enjoy!

The Adult class meets every Sunday morning at 9:30 in the Session room.

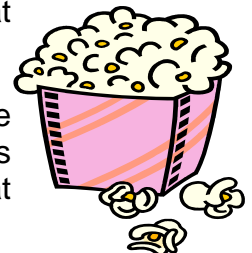
Finley Night at the Movies

FROM THE TREASURER

This month's fund report is on the Marion Fitch Scholarship Fund.

Marion was a longtime, faithful member of Finley. Her favorite pastime was to challenge the thought process of anyone she talked to by asking tough questions that made you think. She was particularly adept at challenging the youth of Finley, and upon her death she remembered the youth by leaving a scholarship fund for the youth of Finley. What a marvelous gift this was! The trustees of Finley decided to engage the expertise of a bank to manage this gift.

Wachovia Bank is the Trustee of this account through their charitable trust division. This fund was established on 10/31/96 by the will of Marion C. Fitch in the amount of \$666,403.32. It is fully invested by the Bank Trustee and the balance as of 9/30/09 was \$719,830.40. To date, \$367,000 has been paid to the children of our members in the form of scholarships. As Church Trustees we carry no balances as indicated above. All scholarship payments are made directly to the recipients by Wachovia Bank in the name of the Marion C. Fitch Scholarship Fund of Finley Memorial Presbyterian Church. Seventeen students have participated in this program in the past year. Finley trustees adjust the scholarship amount each year depending on the number of students and the market conditions at the time. This ensures that the fund will earn enough interest to fund the scholarship requests.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS AND INFORMATION ABOUT SCHOLARSHIPS

1. A parent or step-parent must be a member on the active roll of Finley Memorial Presbyterian Church at least one year before the school starting date for the student. This status will be reviewed annually by the Session.
2. Student must attend an accredited college of higher education, community college or technical school.
3. Advanced education must start before the age of 23 and be continuous thereafter.
4. Ordinarily scholarship awards will be made on a semester basis in January and June.
5. Scholarship awards will be made when proof of successful completion of course work is given to the Trustees of Finley Memorial in writing. Scholarships for fulltime college students will be granted in the full amount for achieving passing grades for the minimum resident class load. This is 12 credit hours for undergraduate study and 9 credit hours for graduate study for fall and spring semesters. Scholarships will be reduced on a prorated basis for meeting less than the above minimum normal semester requirements. Summer semester grants will also be prorated using the same 12/9 hour requirement. Scholarships for community college students will be granted in the amount of 50% of total expenses for courses successfully completed.
6. Full scholarship award amounts will depend on the number of applicants each year and the income the trust receives.

News From the Frontier

In a City far Away a Child is Born. And she shall be called “Daughter of the King”

In November I was in a great city on another continent, and was reunited with a family who had only a few weeks before fled their country following months of particularly harsh persecution. I first met this family in the spring 2006 and have talked about them recently to the youth and in another small group at Finley.

In mid-September I received word from the husband that some particularly difficult persecution would likely cause them to leave the country in the spring of 2010. The father is Russian and a trained Pediatric Surgeon. He had some questions and a couple of Finley members assisted me to answer them for him and provide him with helpful information.

I received another correspondence from the father on or around October 19th. Important papers were coming from the US via DHL. The request from the father was for prayer that the papers arrive safely to him and not be intercepted by the government. I was not certain of details but it was clear that something serious was occurring.

On October 22, I became aware that the seven month pregnant wife of the man who had written to me, and a woman whose picture and stories many of you have heard, was beaten and tied to a chair while the secret police who broke into her home took valuable belongings, a safe, and a couple of computers from the home. A few days later the husband and father managed to quietly purchase plane tickets. In what he calls a miracle, the family successfully boarded a plane and flew out of their country on October 23rd. In the taxi to the airport the father said to their 13 year old son, “If they take me at the airport, you must make sure your mother and the family get on the plane anyway.”

During a recent trip to another continent, I was able to meet with this family twice, the second time on Nov. 14th. The baby was to be born in a couple of weeks. The family showed no sign of physical harm though the wife wore a scarf that covered the cut and stitches from being pistol whipped by one of the policeman. They seemed very happy to see a familiar face.

I received word and a picture on December 7, that the baby girl was born, she and the mom were fine, and that rest of the family were delighted. They named the baby Amira, meaning in Farsi, their native language, “daughter of the King.” The miraculous birth brought to mind the verse in Romans 8:14 “For all who are led by the Spirit of God are children of God.”

How many daughter’s of the King do you see in this picture?
How may do you see around you this Advent season?

Across the Pond - with Laura Latimer-Nolan

Sometimes I feel like I am bi-lingual. I speak only English, but I will say something and I just know that by the look on a persons face, I may as well have spoken Swahili. A very dear friend usually says "I'm sorry, your English got in the way, can you say that again". And it is not just the different words that mean different things, it is also the pronunciation.

Lets take the word "Privacy". In England it is pronounced 'priv-acee'. In the US 'prive-acee'
At home, the conversation usually goes something like:- (him) that is not how you say privacy. (me) that's how we say it in England. (him) well its wrong, its 'prive-acee' here in the US and that is how we say it. (me) it can't be, we invented the language, that's why it is called English. (him) you invented it, we refined it! And so it goes on every time I speak one of those 'foreign' words. You know the song lyrics 'you say tom-ay-do, I say tom-ah-toe'. Another good example is the word Dynasty. In England this word is pronounced 'din-astee', in the US it is die-nastee'.

Then there are the differences in the way the syllables are broken up. For example Controversy. You would make the Con one syllable and the troversy another. In England we break it into 3 syllables, Con-trov-ersy.

Missing letters or changing the sound of the letter is a really tough one to learn and interpret. In the US, 'T' becomes a 'D' - Kady (Katy), Tomado (tomato), Potado (potato). Both US and English English have silent letters. Take for instance Herb. You would say Erb, I would say Herb, or Warwick Castle, you would say the second W, I would not.

All I can say is thank you USA SpellChecker because I would be forever misspelling words when I type: colour, favourite, saviour, aluminium, and all the ises. familiarise, harmonise, etc.

It makes you wonder, just how do other countries learn our language.

When I first moved to the US, I really struggled with the 'language'. My son picked up the accent and language in 6 weeks. He still has to translate for me sometimes, when we are out together. One word I do not translate is my Mum, she will always be my Mum and never my Mom. When I went from being Mum to Mom it took me a long time to get used to it. Most of the time I try to speak American but just in case I forget, opposite is a mini translation dictionary. - Until next month, Cheerio for now! *Laura*

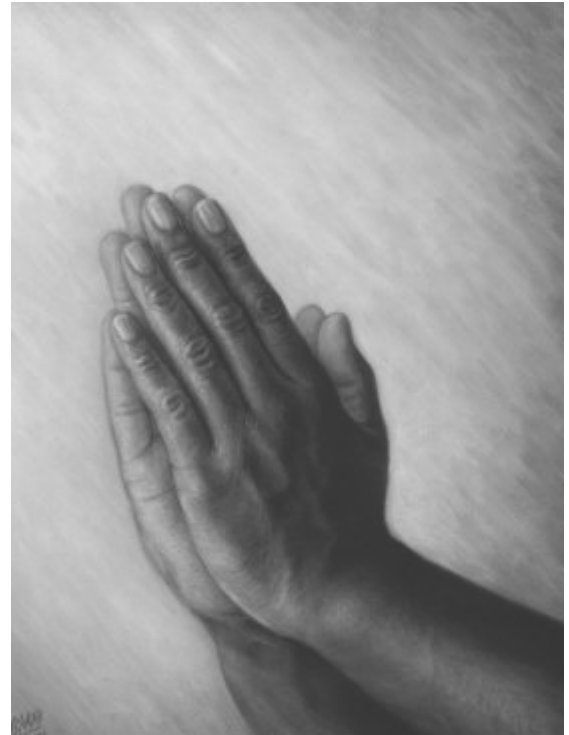
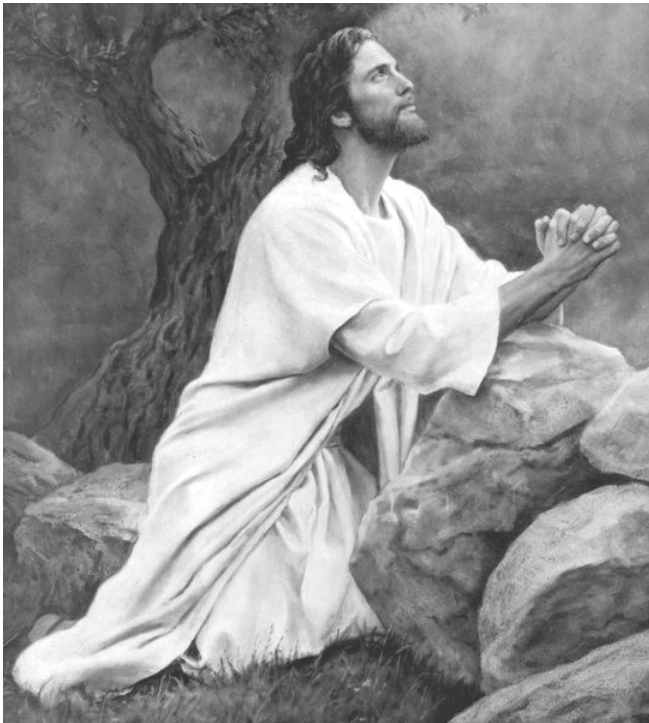
